



OUR EYES SHALL BE ON GOD

It is sunny but blustery on this late November morning as I write. Leaves are hanging on, but winter is coming. The afternoons turn quickly to night. But amid the darkening times and cold wind, I also feel the subtle thrill of Advent approaching, the season in which we prepare ourselves for the coming of Christ into the world again.

I notice the secular consumer-oriented world has announced that "the holiday season" has already arrived, now encompassing Thanksgiving as well as Christmas and Hanukkah. Better get out early and buy, buy, buy lest the fearsome supply chain Grinch eat your children's Christmas. Well, as an inveterate late shopper, I should be more careful this year. But I resist the cultural swallowing of Christ's birthday as purely a children's holiday and shopping season.

There is an important spiritual practice that the ancient Church's seasonal calendar reflects. Just as John the Baptist warned the people then of the need to repent and return to God before the coming of the Messiah, so we now should pause and reflect on our fundamental orientation. Are we facing the future with the faithful hope of Christ's coming again in power and glory? Or are we only nostalgically remembering the babe born in Bethlehem (and our own childhood), and reducing Advent to a season of lights, and Christmas to a pageant story and well-wrapped presents? Are we now bereft of God's active presence? If so, then the times are truly dark.

My beloved friends, I am using the first person plural because I am as much in need of turning and returning to God as anyone. We all need to practice the disciplines of prayer and worship, and strengthen the muscles of memory and hope. Our tradition of spiritual wisdom has always known we are in need of help if we want to live with joy, love, and courage: Help from God through the Holy Spirit, and help from others who share our faith in God. Help through helping, because in service to our neighbors we kindle mutual love and care. By encouraging ourselves and each other to volunteer, give to charity, and remember the neediest, we recover our sense of deep purpose: to make this a better world, what Jesus called the kingdom of heaven, a world he died to make possible, and a world he is coming again to judge. May he find us working with purpose and joy in this and all seasons. Come, Lord Jesus, come.

MEET PARISHIONER MARLI HIGA



"It's giving up control instead of asking God for something. Letting go of what you think your needs are and letting God be God."

This is Marli Higa's description of centering prayer, something she and Father Matt are planning on introducing to the parish as a retreat or an ongoing class, possibly in early 2022. "It's a different way to relate to God," Marli says. "You're sitting in silence. Instead of asking God or thanking God for this or that, there's no dialogue. You're just making yourself available to Him."

Fairly new to Grace Church, Marli first watched services online during "lockdown," then started attending in person once we were allowed back into the sanctuary. Born in Honolulu, Hawaii on the island of Oahu to Japanese American parents, Marli lived in six states — Hawaii, Mississippi, Arizona, Alabama, Missouri and Illinois — as well as Korea before she was in 7th grade. With a father in the US Air Force, moving was a way of life. "I was always the new person, so I'm sensitive to new people," she says. "But I liked starting something new, having fresh goals. Moving around a lot gives you exposure to many different things. But I also like making a home wherever I am."

For college, Marli attended Stanford University, then for graduate school, she moved clear across the country to NYU to earn her Masters in Creative Writing. After graduation, she worked as Publications Director at the Asian-American Arts Alliance, then as a freelance copy editor at several magazines. Since 2011, she has been Copy and Research Chief at *Women's Health*. She also coached varsity track for 14 years at The Spence School, a private girls' school in Manhattan. On top of all that, she is currently writing a novel set in 1937 in New York's West Village whose main characters are mice.

When Father Matt suggested Marli start a class on centering prayer, she agreed to give it a try. "I'd done many forms of meditation over the years and nothing spoke to me. Then I discovered centering prayer. The whole premise is that you are opening yourself up to God, you're consenting to the presence and action of God in you. It's very quiet, but very powerful."

But in case you think centering prayer merely entails sitting still, it also focuses on the practice of intentionally letting go of thoughts, over and over again. This letting go helps you in your daily life, says Marli, because "you learn to let go of things that normally you might hang on to. And because you practice this repeatedly in centering prayer, the impulse to let go and trust in God becomes stronger than whatever is preoccupying you. That is how you feel the effect and the peace of centering prayer."

In addition, you begin to think of God less as a superhuman being and more as a light and an energy that's in you and in everything, Marli explains. "Centering prayer helps you uncover that, so that the light in you which is God, that universal spirit, can come through." Here's hoping we can all find our center, which is God.
