




### WELCOME BACK TO CHURCH!

# MEET PARISHIONER AND VESTRY MEMBER BILL TAYLOR



"I think the church is at its best when it can be bold." – Bill Taylor

Raised in the church whether they like it or not, preachers' kids (PKs) when given the chance often run the other way, vowing never to go into the family business. And so it was with Bill Taylor, Grace Church vestry member and son of an Episcopal priest. Growing up in Ohio and then Darien, CT, Bill said there was a lot of doubt, cynicism and conversations with his dad about the relevance and purpose of the Church. He was going to be lawyer, after all, not a minister.

And then, as so often happens, Bill's life took a different turn.

After graduating from Kenyon College with a degree in history, Bill was headed to law school when one of his parents' friends asked him if he had a passion for the law. "No, I don't," he replied, and that was the end of that plan. With a college degree but no job prospects, his father suggested he go to seminary, emphasizing that he didn't have to become a minister.

Bill agreed, and after marrying his wife Jennifer, he entered Berkeley Divinity School, the Episcopal affiliate of Yale Divinity School. While there, he took a course on adolescents and the church and realized that teaching young people might appeal to him. He knew that he wanted to teach at an Episcopal school, and it just so happened that the chaplain at Trinity-Pawling School was a Berkeley graduate. After completing his two-year seminary degree, Bill was hired to teach history and coach soccer, basketball and tennis at the Episcopal school.

For nine years, Bill was Associate Headmaster at Trinity-Pawling, leaving in 2001 to start St. George's Independent School, another Episcopal school in Memphis, TN. Then in 2015, he was contacted by Trinity-Pawling's search committee. They were looking for someone who could make significant changes to the school's curriculum and move it forward, which is what Bill had been doing in Memphis. Bucking the adage that you can't go home again, Bill returned to Trinity-Pawling, this time as Headmaster, which he still is today.

When asked what brought him and Jennifer to Grace Church, Bill replied that in 2017 his father died, and he felt the need to be in Episcopal worship, "which was ironic because I challenged him for years about the Episcopal liturgy," he said. "Then this past year, Matt reached out to me about the evangelism course, which I joined and really enjoyed. That got me reconnected." The couple joined Grace and Bill joined the vestry.

Bill's vision for Grace: "I am intrigued by what the larger church can do by working collectively across larger regions, in our case, the Hudson Valley, establishing partnerships to create a network of support. In isolation, small churches can only do so much but if you connect different resources together, in time you can make a major imprint. If I can be part of building out Grace so it can have more of an impact, I would love that."

Bold, indeed.


## ALPACA DAY WAS A HIT, RAISING \$8000 FOR GRACE CHURCH PROGRAMS!

Heartfelt thanks also go to Cindy Schmoke, Evelyn Garzetta and Pam Freeman for all their amazing help. It was truly a special day!!



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### **GODLY PLAY RETURNS!**



Dear Grace Church Family,

Some years ago, Grace Church used a curriculum called Godly Play for our youngest children's Sunday School. Last year, Lynda Boissey wondered whether the church still owned the wooden figures and objects used in Godly Play, and after some digging, the materials were found! Beginning this September, Godly Play will once again be offered for children ages 3-6.

Godly Play is an approach to children's spiritual formation in which stories of faith are presented and the group wonders about them together. The goal is to teach children how to use the language of the Christian tradition to encounter God.

We will use the enclosed porch adjacent to the parish hall as our Godly Play classroom. It will be known as Betty Rae's Room in honor of Betty Rae Nittiskie, who loved and taught the children of Grace for many years. All we need now are some teachers and assistants! I will do some of the teaching but I need a few others to help. Experience is not necessary; we will provide training. If you choose to become a teacher or an assistant, you will find your own faith growing in ways that will surprise you!
